

THE LAST ICE AGE • Upper Paleolithic (from about 40,000 to about 10,000 years ago) the world was undergoing its last ice age. • Climate was much colder (about 10° C) • Extremes between the seasons were greater • Plants and animals were adapted to the climate - Megafauna




OF HUMAN CULTURE

- HOMESITES
- TENTLIKE STRUCTURES WERE BUILT IN SOME CAVES TO PROTECT AGAINST COLD WEATHER
- SOME SITES HAD MUTLIPLE HUTS WHICH CONTAINED TWENTY TO TWENTY-FIVE RELATED FAMILY MEMBERS

NEW TOOL TECHNIQUES

- INDIRECT PERCUSSION
 - USING A HAMMER-STRUCK PUNCH • BURINS - CHISEL-LIKE STONE TOOLS
 - BLADES WERE TWICE AS LONG
- PRESSURE FLAKING
 - PRESSURE WITH BONE, WOOD, OR ANTLER TO APPLY FINISHING TOUCHES TO TOOLS
 - MICROLITHS SMALLER BLADES, OFTEN HAFTED OR FITTED WITH HANDLES
- CREATION OF ATLATLS
 - A SPEAR WEAPON PROPELLED OFF A GROOVED BOARD WHICH COULD BE SENT OFF WITH INCREASED FORCE







	SELF-EXPRESSION ART
	- TRACES OF ART FOUND IN BEADS, CARVINGS, AND PAINTINGS
	 CAVE PAINTINGS IN SPAIN AND SOUTHERN FRANCE SHOWED A MARKED DEGREE OF SKILL
•	SUBJECT OF PAINTING
	 MOSTLY ANIMALS ON BARE WALLS SUBJECTS WERE ANIMALS FAVORED FOR THEIR MEAT AND SKINS
	- HUMAN FIGURES WERE RARELY DRAWN DUE TO TABOOS AND FEARS THAT IT WOULD SOMEHOW HARM OTHERS
•	FEMALE FIGURINES
	 CALLED "VENUSES," THESE FIGURINES DEPICTED WOMEN WITH LARGE BREASTS AND BROAD HIPS
	 PERHAPS IT WAS AN EXAMPLE OF AN IDEAL TYPE, OR PERHAPS AN EXPRESSION OF A DESIRE FOR FERTILITY

- VERDICT IS STILL OUT ON WHETHER OR NOT HUMANS ARRIVED IN THE NEW WORLD BEFORE OR AFTER DATES SOME 11,500 YEARS AGO
- PASSAGE TO THE NEW WORLD
 - BERINGIA, THE ICE SHEETS, AND A PASSAGE IN BETWEEN ALLOWING FOR MIGRATION FROM ASIA
- · LINGUISTIC THEORY
 - THREE WAVES OF MIGRATION BROUGHT WITH THEM THREE DIFFERENT FORMS OF LANGUAGE

 - AMERIND FAMILY OF LANGUAGE
 NA DENE FAMILY (SOME N. AMER. INDIAN)
 INUIT-ALEUT FAMILY (4,000 YEARS AGO)
